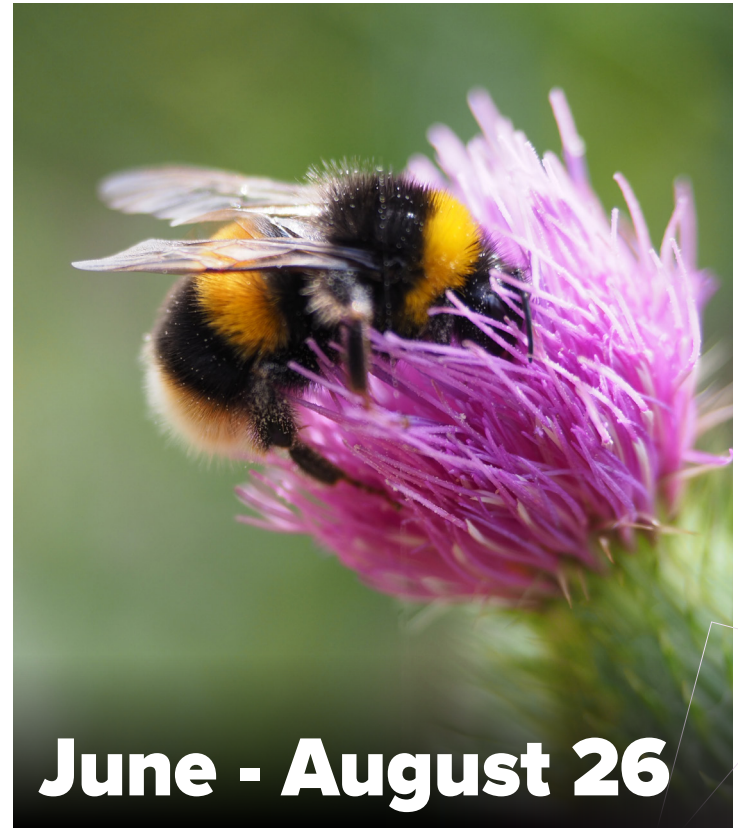

Fruit of the Spirit

A reflection from The Very Revd Dr Jessica Martin, The Dean of Chelmsford:

...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control'. So writes Paul to the church in Galatia (Gal.5.22-3).

I've found myself really thinking about that word 'fruit'. That cluster of wonders in Paul's sentence – well, it looks like a collection of virtues: habits of mind and heart. In some ways, it can look like.... a programme.

These are ways to learn to be: to be patient, to be loving, to be self-controlled, to be a giving person. And that sounds like effort - more like planting than fruiting.

But that's not how Paul sees it. This isn't about a mighty effort to be a good person and do the right thing. These are the outworkings of an amazing divine gift. That gift is freedom.

Paul is describing what the Spirit brings about in a spirit-filled person, and he makes that description in contrast to the enslaved behaviours of someone possessed by the passions that limit or stifle love – jealousy

and anger, disagreements and factionalism, envy and addictions, idolatry, out-of-control behaviours of every kind. All those passions make us smaller, sadder people, narrowing our focus and our choices, dimming our inner vision so that we cannot see the range of creative possibility God sets before us.

There is an untrammelled nature to us that only the Spirit can set free, liberating us into love rather than suspicion; making us joyful rather than ill-at-ease or anxious; helping us to be at peace rather than in dissension, to give rather than to withhold.

We can't create the fruits of the Spirit. Love can be cultivated, but it can't be willed into being.

Joy is a spontaneous gift, not a practice. What is asked of us is only this: to open ourselves to God's endlessly creative will.

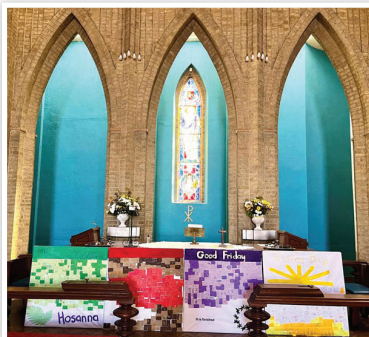

Annual Safeguarding Service of Thanksgiving and Recommitment

The Chelmsford Diocese annual service of thanksgiving, prayer and recommitment for all who are involved in safeguarding will take place on Monday 8 June at 7pm at Chelmsford Cathedral.

The service is an opportunity to thank those who help keep people safe in our church communities, including Parish Safeguarding Officers (PSOs), who support a positive church culture and help implement safeguarding policies for children, young people and vulnerable adults.

Ann Pinnock, from St John the Evangelist in the Parish of Grays North and Stifford, has been involved in children's ministry for over 40 years. In 2003, she became the parish's nominated person for CRB disclosures and has since taken on the roles of lead recruiter and PSO.

Reflecting on changes over the years, Ann highlights how developments in technology and improved processes have strengthened safeguarding practice: "Today, most people have access to the internet, DBS applications are completed online, training takes place on Zoom, and national safeguarding policies are easily accessible. It's much easier to circulate information. There is also greater involvement from the PCC and church leadership, especially since the introduction of the Safeguarding Dashboard, leading to increased awareness, understanding, and a whole-church commitment to providing a safe environment."

Ann also shares what motivates her to continue in her role as PSO: "Firstly, I've been able to share the workload with my incumbent and trained members of the PCC, who support me with safe recruitment and risk assessments.

"Secondly, I've made good use of the support offered by the Diocesan Safeguarding Team. I'm grateful for their readiness to help, and I find the drop-in Zoom sessions particularly valuable.

"Thirdly, I feel called by God to this work as part of the Body of Christ. Our God is compassionate and loving, caring deeply for the vulnerable and marginalised, as shown in the ministry of Jesus. In 1 Corinthians 12:28, Paul includes administration among the gifts given by God. This inspires me to ensure that our church is always a welcoming and safe place for worship and fellowship."

From 1 June - 14 June 2026 the Church of England is running a campaign - 'It's Not Just Policy, It's Personal' - to raise awareness of how to recognise and report safeguarding concerns.

Supporting Those Who Serve: Resources for Churchwardens

The Revd Andy Griffiths, Lead Adviser for Wellbeing and Formation in Chelmsford Diocese says: "When I was considering whether to apply for my present role, which has to do with ministerial formation and wellbeing, I asked an Archdeacon, 'who is responsible for the wellbeing of incumbents?' 'Oh, we have someone in every community whose role is to take care of the incumbent and their household,' the Archdeacon said. 'They're called Churchwardens.'"

That observation captures something essential about the vocation of a Churchwarden. They play a vital and wide-ranging role, having six core responsibilities: they are officers of the Bishop, trustees of a charity, leaders in mission and ministry, representatives of the laity, key figures during vacancies, and, not least, a source of care and support for their clergy.

For many Churchwardens, the reality of the role is both rewarding and demanding - especially for those who have been newly elected following the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and who may still be finding their feet.

This naturally raises an important question: who supports the Churchwardens?

In many ways, the answer lies in the shared life of the Church. As a diocese, we are all encouraged to uphold Churchwardens in prayer, to offer encouragement, and to be mindful of the pressures they may carry. Small gestures - adjusting expectations, offering practical help, or simply saying thank you - can make a significant difference.

Alongside this, local networks are an increasingly valuable source of support, connection, and learning. One such example is the Witham Deanery Churchwardens' Network, which provides a space for Churchwardens to share experiences, ask questions, and build relationships across parishes. Their next networking event will take place at 10am on 24 October at St Luke's Church Hall, Tiptree.

Speakers will include diocesan staff, offering Churchwardens the opportunity to explore a range of practical topics and to ask questions in an open and supportive setting. This summer, the Church of England offers a new campaign centred around pilgrimage. Christian pilgrimage has roots in the earliest centuries of the church, when believers travelled to places linked with Jesus and the apostles and, later, saints. At the heart of being a pilgrim is our journey through life, on which we are strengthened by visiting special sites where others have prayed and worshipped before us.

Running from the day after Pentecost (25 May) to 21 June, the campaign is supported by a wide range of resources. Daily reflections focus on eight places significant to the spread of Christianity in England, alongside the stories of the saints who lived there. Contributions written by the Archbishops and others, are available both in print and through digital platforms such as the Everyday Faith app. Each day will include a Bible reading, a prayer, a short reflection and a suggested action or reflective question.

A key part of the campaign is inviting churches to become recognised Pilgrim Places: welcoming spaces where anyone can pause, reflect, and pray. Participating churches will display clear signage and offer prayer cards, self-guided trails, and reflective questions, creating an open invitation for visitors of all backgrounds to

explore. These churches are featured on online maps and can be tagged on A Church Near You, helping people find their nearest Pilgrim Place.

Resources are available for all churches - downloadable materials, social media ideas, and storytelling content - so the pilgrimage theme can be shared with their church communities.

Individuals and families are warmly invited to take part. This might involve visiting a nearby church, following a reflection trail, or taking time to pause and pray in a quiet space. Whether walking part of a local route or simply stepping into a church for a few moments of stillness, everyone can take part in this journey.

Celebrating the Catalyst 2025 Cohort

At the end of January, 17 children's and youth ministry workers and volunteers gathered at the Catalyst Course residential in Swanwick, Derbyshire.

The weekend offered a valuable chance to learn from respected voices in children and youth ministry, meet peers from across the country, and enjoy inspiring teaching, worship, and time for rest.

Participant Alison described it as "a weekend full of prayer and worship... a unique time to be with like-minded people, all on a similar journey."

The residential also gave space for people to share their stories and faith journeys. Cisse said: "The meaningful connections and deep conversations really stayed with me... I've already started putting the practical tools into action."

As part of the course, students complete a presentation on youth and families ministry in their own context. This cohort gave their presentations in April and celebrated graduation at Ridley Hall on 16 May.

Catalyst, run through Ridley Hall in Cambridge, is a six-month training course for anyone involved in children's or youth ministry, whether paid or voluntary. It offers space to grow, reflect, share ideas and gain practical skills with support from an experienced team. The course is fully funded by the Church of England as part of the 30K project to raise up 30,000 new children and youth leaders by 2030.

Emma Anderton, diocesan facilitator for the Catalyst course, said: "It's an absolute joy to work with the Catalyst students and facilitate shared learning. The final presentations show some of the incredible ministry with children and young people happening across our diocese."

Empowering the Windrush Generation: local Mother's Union leader makes a difference

Monday 22 June is National Windrush Day, marking the arrival of HMT Empire Windrush at Tilbury in our diocese in 1948. The ship carried Caribbean passengers invited to help rebuild the UK after the Second World War.

Despite their vital contributions, many faced discrimination, and some were wrongly deported or denied rights due to missing documentation - a failure later known as the Windrush Scandal.

The Windrush Compensation Scheme (WCS) was established to address these harms, but challenges remain, including low awareness, limited trust, delays, and a complex process.

Kemi Ademola, Branch Leader of Leyton Emmanuel Mothers' Union, has spent the past two years working with the WCS to raise awareness across East London and support eligible individuals. Her work focuses on outreach, training, and helping people navigate both status and compensation processes.

Kemi first heard about the scheme through her work at the Department for Work and Pensions as it was known Kemi was actively involved in her local church and other community initiatives across Waltham Forest, including being leader of the Emmanuel Parish Mothers' Union. "Since launching a Black History Month programme

in 2017, I have used this platform to promote dialogue and highlight issues affecting our community," explained Kemi.

Working with the Windrush Stakeholder Engagement Team, Kemi has delivered presentations at Black History Month events, creating safe, welcoming spaces for people to share experiences, ask questions, and receive guidance.

The impact has been significant, with individuals and families receiving compensation, and many encountering positive, firsthand accounts of successful claims for the first time.

Further partnership has trained ten volunteer facilitators from Emmanuel Parish and neighbouring East London parishes, supporting applications and building trust through lived experience.

Kemi's dedication has been recognised with an OBE in the King's New Year Honours List, presented at Windsor Castle in April by HRH The Princess Royal.

As we mark Windrush Day, we pray and give thanks for the contributions of the Windrush generation and renew our commitment to ensuring their legacy is honoured not only in words, but in action.

Debden Bee Corridor launched

Church, Council and Community work together to boost biodiversity

In May, the community of Debden gathered in the village hall to celebrate the launch of the Debden Bee Corridor Project. This joint project - led by the Eco Church Team at St Mary the Virgin Church and the Debden Parish Council, with funding from the Essex Local Nature Partnership - aims to boost local biodiversity by creating a continuous ribbon of nectar-rich habitats for bees and other pollinators throughout the village.

The project will transform key green spaces and inspire residents to create bee-friendly gardens of their own.

As part of the programme, the Debden Green telephone box will be converted into a miniature nature hub. Bee hotels will also be installed across the village, including a striking butterfly-shaped bee hotel now standing in St Mary's churchyard, installed with help from pupils at Debden Church of England Primary School.

At the launch event, the Revd Lynda Sebbage, Team Vicar of St Mary the Virgin and All Saints Church, welcomed Master Beekeepers Richard and Jane Ridler, who delivered an inspiring talk on the importance of bees and how the community can support them in the months ahead.

Attendees received bee-friendly window stickers to display in support of the project, and the Debden Gardening Club offered pollinator-friendly plants for a small donation for residents to take home and plant.

Reflecting on the event, Revd Lynda said: "We were absolutely delighted with the turnout for the launch of our bee and pollinator programme. The village hall was full of people eager to learn more about the vital role bees and all pollinating insects play in our world."

As part of the wider project, the church also organised a community planting day, bringing the local community together to add pollinator-friendly plants to key spots around the village.

Revd Lynda added, "What this project continues to show is that partnership is the key to success. Church, parish council, school, pub, and the wider community have all come together with a shared purpose. As the church leads this forward, it is yet another expression of outreach - a reminder that being church extends far beyond the walls of the building."

In 2025, incumbents across our diocese were invited to join Launchpad, a Youthscape coaching programme supporting parishes to begin youth work and help more children and young people encounter God's love.

The Bradwell Episcopal Area Launchpad Celebration in May marked the end of the course. It was a joyful and encouraging evening with clergy sharing what they had discovered through Launchpad and the practical steps they had begun to take within their parish communities.

The participants (pictured above) gathered at St Peter and St Paul's, Grays, alongside The Rt Revd Adam Atkinson, the Bishop of Bradwell, The Ven. Sue Lucas, the Archdeacon of Southend and members of the diocesan Children, Young People and Families team – the Mustard Seed Team – who led the course and supported the cohort throughout the programme.

The Revd James Webster, Rector of the Icknield Way Parish, also took part in Launchpad training in our Colchester Episcopal Area. Reflecting on his experience, James explains how Launchpad helped him begin youth work in his parish:

"When I arrived as Rector 18 months ago, there was one teenager who regularly attended church, but people were aware of many other teens who might be interested in a Youth

Group. So I gratefully accepted the invitation to undertake Launchpad training – it was excellent!

"On top of some very helpful and insightful training, being part of a group of clergy who were at different stages with their groups helped instil confidence that establishing a Youth Group could be done.

"At an initial 'open evening' last June the course material went down well, and since the autumn, we've had a steady group of half a dozen teens that meet monthly during term-time on a Saturday evening. Small beginnings but a big impact!

"The group chose to use the 'Unfold' material – a Bible study that starts light at an A4 size but unfolds larger as you go deeper into the study. It took us four sessions to finish the first study; such was the level of engagement following on from the youth group essential of pizzas!

"We're just about to start Alpha Youth – I know it'll throw up all sorts of things, but as the group has gelled over the last six months, I also know it'll be very good!"

The Bishop of Chelmsford's Lent Appeal: Donations open until 1 July

Thank you to everyone who has donated to The Bishop of Chelmsford's Lent Appeal this year. So far, we have raised over £10,000 for Anglican Development Services of Mt Kenya East (ADSMKE) to support their work in response to climate change and in environmental conservation across our five linked partner dioceses - Embu, Kirinyaga, Meru, Mbeere and Marsabit - in Kenya.

Communities across Mt Kenya East are facing the harsh realities of the climate crisis. Years of recurring drought have devastated harvests, depleted natural resources and pushed families into increased hardship.

In response to these challenges, ADSMKE is leading inspiring, community-driven work to restore the environment and strengthen livelihoods. The Revd Sandra Eldridge, former Diocesan Environment Officer, visited the Mt Kenya East region in Kenya earlier this year and

saw firsthand the impact of the climate crisis. Sandra has written the report below following her trip: "I've recently spent a month in the Mt Kenya East region with my husband, Dave.

Although climate change has been affecting communities in Kenya for two decades, the effects are clearly getting worse. We visited many homesteads and communities. In one homestead, where they welcomed us generously with Kenyan tea and sweet potato, we were told "We have been experiencing climate change for 20 years, but we've never seen anything like this."

The person who said this to us was referring to the failure of the autumn rains in 2025 and the resulting drought. Kenya has two rainy seasons per year, the short rains between October and December and the long rains between March and May. Farmers rely on these rains for crop growth and to provide water for household consumption.

Cathedral Day Chaplains: a caring pastoral presence for visitors and the wider community

The Chelmsford Cathedral Day Chaplains are a valued and growing volunteer ministry, currently made up of clergy and lay members. Their presence is a gift to the Cathedral - offering welcome, a listening ear, pastoral care, and prayerful support to all who come through its doors.

The Revd Mark Pape, Curate at St Andrew's Chelmsford and The Ascension with All Saints, Chelmsford and the Revd Eileen Rose, Priest-in-Charge in the Benefice of Little Ilford St Barnabas, are part of the Cathedral Day Chaplaincy Team and explain more about this important ministry.

Eileen says: "Having had a positive experience at Chelmsford Cathedral during my training as an ordinand I was keen to volunteer as a Cathedral Day Chaplain. The opportunity to take on a role where I could pray and support those who ask for it, was a privilege and also a personal interest as I could give back to the Cathedral."

"No day is the same, and we rarely see the same people, but it's great to be part of a wider team supporting the work of the Cathedral alongside serving in the parishes", explains Mark.

Eileen adds: "On rare occasions, I've had the pleasure of seeing some of those I have prayed

for, return and request prayer again. These moments feel particularly special, as I only volunteer a few hours each month and typically encounter different people each time. These encounters make me feel connected to the Cathedral and the local community, that I'm building a relationship from the inside and is reaching outside into the world."

Mark continues: "Many visitors to the Cathedral are tourists, or they're popping in on their lunch break, or they want to light a candle to remember a relative. But many more come with burdens, things going on at home, or something weighing heavy on them from work, or to do with their health. It's a privilege to be a non-anxious presence in the Cathedral, to help them and for that short little time to help carry the load of whatever it is that has brought them through the doors of the Cathedral and to send them on their way, listened to and prayed for."

Pray for the Chelmsford Cathedral Day Chaplaincy Team, that this ministry continues to flourish, offering a consistent and caring pastoral presence for visitors and the wider community.

We saw how important community work is in these circumstances. We visited several women's groups where the women are supporting each other, often through collective loan schemes, to improve their circumstances. We also saw how communities are themselves digging trenches for water pipes so that they can have water piped to their homesteads for the first time ever. When rivers and reservoirs are running dry more often, piped water becomes even more important. The alternative is fetching water using 20 litre water carriers, sometimes carried by donkeys.

We also saw the effort being put into planting trees, trees that will improve eco systems, prevent soil erosion and provide shade. In such dry conditions it's important to plant a variety of native trees and to take care of them to ensure the best chance of survival.

We also saw the difference water provision, harvesting and storage can make to building resilience of families and communities. This saves time in fetching water and saves money by reducing the need to buy water from communal water points

Finally, we saw what happens when the situation becomes extreme. In northern arid areas, in Marsabit Diocese, environmental damage is being exacerbated because some people have no other way of making a living except by cutting down trees to make charcoal that they can sell.

However, the Kenyan church is planting trees wherever it can."

Pray for all those who feel the harsh effects of the climate crisis - those facing loss, uncertainty, and hardship as a result of climate change. Pray also for the work of ADSMKE, as they walk alongside communities across our link partner dioceses in Kenya, bringing hope, resilience, and practical support.

Hundreds of children to take part in the Bradwell Schools' Pilgrimage

Tucked away on the Essex coastline, St Peter-on-the-Wall Chapel at Bradwell-on-Sea is usually a place of quiet reflection. Yet in June and July each year, it comes alive as hundreds of children gather for the annual Bradwell Schools' Pilgrimage, held in the weeks leading up to the Diocesan Pilgrimage and Gathering.

This year, around 500 children are expected to visit the chapel across five days. Each school group will take part in a full programme of activities, beginning and ending with worship. Pupils will explore the pilgrimage theme through a series of interactive workshops and enjoy a specially commissioned performance by the Artless Theatre Company, bringing to life the story of St Cedd, the founder of the chapel. The experience concludes with a final act of worship before the children return along the coastal path to their waiting coaches.

The pilgrimage is run by the Chelmsford Diocese Children's, families and youth team - the Mustard Seed Team - the Chelmsford Diocese Education Team and members of the local church community. This year's theme for both the Schools' Pilgrimage and the wider diocesan gathering is Living Stones.

The 2026 Bradwell Pilgrimage will take place on Saturday 4 July - a cherished tradition that brings together people from all walks of life to celebrate our shared spiritual journey.

Starting at St Thomas' Church, Bradwell-on-Sea, the pilgrimage follows a scenic route to the ancient Chapel of St Peter-on-the-Wall, one of the oldest churches in England, founded in AD 654.

- Christian stalls in the marquee
- Children's activities.

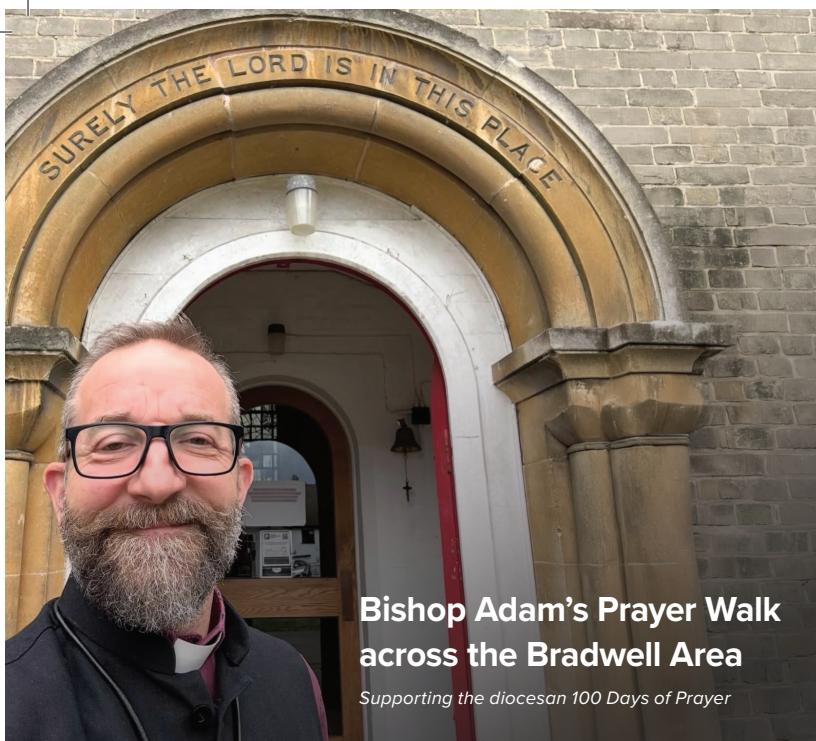

The reopening of St Mary's Church, Stebbing marked with a special service on Palm Sunday

St Mary's Church in Stebbing reopened on Palm Sunday with a special service celebrating the completion of a major restoration project.

Around 300 guests gathered to mark the reopening of the Grade I listed building, which had been closed since October 2024. The service marked a major milestone in The Way Forward project, made possible through funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, as well as support from charitable trusts and the local community.

The service was led by the Vicar of St Mary's, the Revd Sue Hurley and attended by representatives from across the community and the Diocese of Chelmsford, including project partners, contractors, volunteers, local residents and the Archdeacon of Stanstead, the Venerable Kate Peacock.

Guests saw the transformed interior of St Mary's for the first time, including new underfloor heating, improved lighting, flexible seating and enhanced facilities to support both worship and wider community use. The restoration carefully balances modern improvements with the preservation of the church's historic character, helping to secure its future for generations to come.

After the service, guests gathered for a hog roast

and refreshments to celebrate the completion of the works and reflect on the journey that made the project possible.

The Revd Sue Hurley said: "This has been an extraordinary journey for our church and community. After years of planning, fundraising and hard work, it was wonderful to welcome people back into St Mary's and celebrate together. This building has always been at the heart of the village, and now it is ready to serve the community in new and exciting ways."

The reopening of St Mary's marks not an end, but a new beginning. A programme of events and activities will continue throughout the year, inviting people of all ages to experience the building as a place of heritage, community and creativity.

St Mary's also hosted an open day in April, giving the wider public a chance to explore the church, learn more about its history and enjoy family-friendly activities.

Course in Christian Studies and Pastoral Care Course Celebration

On Saturday 28 February, hundreds of people from churches across Chelmsford Diocese gathered at Chelmsford Cathedral to celebrate those completing the Chelmsford Diocese Course in Christian Studies (CCS) and Pastoral Care Part One Course.

The Rt Revd Roger Morris, Bishop of Colchester, led the service and presented certificates to more than 120 people who had completed diocesan training courses.

Fifteen CCS groups were represented, showing the breadth and diversity of the diocese, with learners taking part in person and on Zoom. CCS is a two-year foundation course in the Christian faith, with a first year in theology and a second in ministry, helping students explore different vocations and ministries in the Church. Learners receive a certificate each year, with full completion leading to the Bishop's Certificate.

The Pastoral Care Part 1 Course is for lay people and introduces pastoral care skills in a Christian context. It is designed for those already caring for others and wanting to grow in confidence and develop their role within their church. It is the first of two courses leading to Authorised Pastoral Assistant ministry in Chelmsford Diocese.

Canon Caroline Harding, Warden of Readers and Lay Ministry Adviser, said: "It is always a

joy to celebrate the commitment and growth of those who complete these courses. They reflect the richness and diversity of our diocese, and their willingness to learn and serve is deeply encouraging. We pray that what they have discovered will continue to shape their faith and ministry in the years ahead."

The Blessing of Kennedy Footbridge

Kennedy Footbridge has provided a crossing over the railway between Barking and Dagenham Dock since the 1950s, linking the Eastbury and Gascoigne Wards. For decades it enabled safe passage between Kennedy Road and Blake Avenue/Harrow Road and was an essential community route within the Parish of St Patrick, Barking.

Over time, despite monitoring by residents and Network Rail, the bridge's ageing structure deteriorated. In August 2022 the bridge collapsed, and it was immediately closed and demolished, leaving the community without a direct crossing.

The loss was felt by the parish, which spans both sides of the line. The Rev'd Chris Bolster, then Vicar of St Patrick's, Barking, played a key role in campaigning for a replacement, supported by Cllr Alison Cormack and churchwarden, Marion Hull. Although Chris moved from the parish in 2024, the campaign continued.

Network Rail announced that construction of a new footbridge would begin in July 2025. The steel replacement, designed to reflect the original structure, was completed in December 2025.

As the bridge reopened, St Patrick's, Barking welcomed a new chapter with the arrival of the Revd Sade Barnes as Vicar. On 8 April 2026, the community gathered for a celebration and blessing of the new Kennedy Footbridge, led by the Rt Revd Lynne Cullens, the Bishop of Barking, with local councillors, the MP for Barking, and Network Rail representatives in attendance.

The Revd Sade Barnes, said: "We were delighted to invite Bishop Lynne to bless The Kennedy Footbridge. A bridge connects communities, and I hope our community will remain united, continuing to support each other and look out for one another."

Bishop Lynne added: "In my years of ministry, this was the first time I have ever been invited to bless a footbridge, and it was a real joy. The Kennedy Footbridge represents connection and community spirit. It's a vital link for the parish of St Patrick's Barking and it will serve the local community safely for generations to come."

The service not only marked the reopening of the bridge but also celebrated the dedication and determination of the local community who worked together to make it happen.
